Editorial.















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THE QUEEN ELIZABETH II CORONATION STAMP

The editor has forwarded to me replies which two members have very kindly submitted to clear up the point which I raised in "Query Spot" (The Springbok 38 (5) p.112) concerning the Queen Elizabeth II Coronation Stamp of South Africa (SAC/H 118) - namely, do sheets from cylinder 98 exist with both arrangements of the panes, due to transposition of cutting, as stated in the Golden Jubilee Edition of the Handbook catalogue (1960)? Or was this edition somehow in error, as implied by the amendments in Vol. II (1964), which are carried through into the Definitive Edition of 1986?

Alan Cains of Ilfracombe reports matching blocks from each cylinder covering exactly the same part of the sheet as mine (stamps 9, 10, central gutter, 11 and 12 from rows 1 to 6, with top and bottom sheet margins) - but the location of varieties on his blocks is exactly the opposite from their location on mine. He also describes a number of smaller blocks, and makes the point that the colour of the stamps varies widely in printings from both cylinders; so that colour alone cannot be used to allocate stamps to printings from one cylinder or the other.

Fred Clark of Derby also reports a similar block of 24 from cylinder 66, which shows the same varieties as Alan Cains' block. More importantly, he has a complete sheet (both panes and central gutter) from cylinder 98 with V3 present on Row 6/11; and he has charted the positions of all the catalogued varieties on this sheet. By chance I also, since submitting my query for publication, have acquired another large block, including the central gutter, from cylinder 98 with V3 present on Row 6/11.

The location of the catalogued varieties on Fred Clark's sheet from cylinder 98 is as follows:

So, from the information now to hand, we are in a position to make two unequivocal statements:

- (i) the position described in the 1960 Handbook catalogue is correct transposition of panes (due to transposition of cutting) did occur in sheets printed from both cylinders, and the 1986 Definitive Edition needs to be corrected on this point; and
- (ii) the *Handbook catalogue* sometimes locates varieties in the wrong pane with reference to the position of the "key" variety, V3. A correct catalogue entry should, therefore, read as follows:

118 2d. Deep violet-blue. Shades of ultramarine

Per pair with gutter between and cylinder number on bottom margin

- Ca. Issue 1. No. 98, without dot in right arc of "O" of SOUTH on right-hand stamp.
- Cb. Issue 1. No. 98, with dot in "O".

- Ce. Issues 1 and 2. Marginal arrow block of four.

- V1. Mark under chin. Row 2/7 or 17.

- V3. Dot in right arc of "O" of SOUTH. Row 6/1 or 11.

- V4. White screen scratch through "U" of SOUTH. Row 1/1 or 11.
- V5. White dot over "K" of KRONING. Row 1/10 or 20.
- V6. White screen scratch through "O" and below "U" of SOUTH. Row 2/1 or 11.
- V7. Q for second "O" in CORONATION. Row 3/19 or 9.
- V8. Round mark on neck touching line of cheek. Row 4/17 or 7.
- V9 Spot on bottom left of "2". Row 5/15 or 5.

Cylinder No. 66

- V10. Mark on upper lip. Row 1/12 or 2.
- V11. Defective letters in POSSEEL and POSTAGE. Row 2/18 or 8.
- V12. White screen scratch running downward to the right from "D" of SUID. Row 5/20 or 10.

SOUTH AFRICAN REVENUE STAMPS

QUERY No. 1

I am in a dilemma over the items of KG5 and other issues being overprinted with CUSTOMS DUTY and those with DOUANE.

KG5, the 1st Issue, are overprinted with "CUSTOMS DUTY", see Sherwood's catalogue, page 34, foot, where he also made an amendment to delete the word "DOUANE" and substitute with "DUTY". So far so good.

The next item 1926... is a mixture of both overprints, however it does differentiate the two types of overprint but does not separate the London and Pretoria printings of the halfpenny and 1d stamps, simply stating RECESS. This also applies to the 1927 listing.

In my humble opinion these listings from 1926 are in error with the mixture of both overprints. I suggest that the CUSTOM DUTY overprints should precede those of DOUANE as I cannot visualise a printer using two types of overprint on the same type of job.

The usual type of South African catalogues do not list REVENUE STAMPS, even the very early catalogues.

LOBDELL's book The De La Rue Georgians of South Africa, page 63, reads and I quote:


2. CUSTOMS DUTY: The following denominations were overprinted "CUSTOMS/DUTY", letters 1.5mm high and CUSTOMS 15.5 long in black (fig 52) halfpenny, 1d., 2d., 3d. black and orange-red, 3d. blue and blue, 4d., 6d., (two shades) and 1/-. The same overprint was also applied in red to the 3d. black and orange-red and the 6d. (157)

Footnote (157) refers to the Act of 1914, Customs Tariff Act. From that we know that Sherwood's listing was precise except the mention of the 6d. shades. I have had a quick look through the early issues of the South African Philatelist, and it does not reveal anything about South African material, however, it does refer to Revenues of the U.S.A. and of two covers from South Africa to Southern Rhodesia, bearing the then current Revenue Stamps and postally used without any surcharge. However, persisting in further search I found that the Revenue stamps were listed under "STAMPS PRINTED" and later on an article, which will follow.

Vol 3, pages 115 & 116 of this magazine does give a little information.
