Having thanked him, as I try to do for the most modest of requests and replies, I feel that on your behalf our thanks must be made to *all* our contributors for the time and effort they have clearly devoted to the research and formulation of articles, and no less the temerity (?) to seek publication! There are a few more available along with a personal recollection that you shall see in due course. Thank you, and welcome to the next article.

SOUTH AFRICAN PHILATELIC CINDERELLAS

This listing does not claim to be complete - one of the nice things about Cinderella collecting are the surprises which one so seldom gets in regular stamp collecting. I hope readers will write and tell me about the gaps and errors.

When I wrote about S.A. War Labels (Springbok 37, 2 & 3), I numbered each entry, WAR1, WAR2 etc, but additions and amendments soon made a mess of this, and I shall have to re-set it again one day. In most cases it has been possible to arrange this philatelic material in chronological order, and reference can be made by title and date.

A number of these labels are large, and some whole sheets have been included because of marginal information. Often these have been reduced (A3 to A4) and this is indicated in the text.

THE VOORTREKKER MONUMENT FUND, 1933

Three semi-postal stamps (SG 51 - 53) were issued by the Post Office which carried a surcharge to help with the Voortrekker Monument Fund. Concurrently, definitive postage stamps were on sale and these three large blue labels were produced as advertisement to encourage people to choose the Voortrekker stamps. A smaller version in blue also exists with an informative "wing" on the right hand side.













SWA Third Definitive Papers: - On receipt of Des Greenhalgh's study, I enquired of him as to the type of "lamp" used, as I am aware of the apparently conflicting results obtained when unspecified lamps have been used. Here is his description:

"My U/V lamp is a "PRINZ" (German) and all the details are:-

UV TESTLAMPE 4W/366nm Model No. FL-78 U.K. Patent No. D.R. No. 978107. It is a SHORT-WAVE lamp, box type, measuring 16cm x 8.75cm and 3cm deep. That is overall size, and in it there is a black (or dark navy blue) fluorescent tube, including metal ends, 13.5cm. The tube is \pm 1cm diameter and uses 5 x LR14 batteries."

THE POSTAL STONES OF SOUTH AFRICA

The Springbok, Vol. 22, pages 102 et seq. gave a detailed listing of the Postal Stones of South Africa with illustrations, reduced of course.

Another listing is from South African Museum, *Inscriptions left by early European navigators on their way to the east*, Guide leaflet no. 1, 3rd edition, September 1950 and its preface which states "further information would become known".

Focus on South Africa, June 1990, bears this statement out as on the front page there is an illustration of a newly found stone, and of it being examined. The newly discovered stone weighs 2 kilograms, and in comparison with the hands of the holder it would seem to be about 12" long and 4" wide. *Focus* states, An historic 16th century Portuguese post office stone is unearthed by a labourer at the Milnerton Watersports Club, Cape Town. Archaeologists at the S.A. Museum say it is the third-oldest inscribed post office stone to come to light. Archaeologist Bill van Rijse shows the stone, which reads:

Captain Cristovao de Mendonca came here in the [ship] Victoria on the 25th of May 1524. A coin is buried. All well. God be praised.

The stone will be given to the South African Cultural History Museum. Some historians believe Captain Mendonca discovered Australia.

ROLL OF DISTINGUISHED PHILATELISTS OF SOUTHERN AFRICA

ANOTHER U.K. SIGNATORY

Your Hon. Membership Secretary and your Hon. General Secretary were privileged guests of the Philatelic Federation of Southern Africa at a reception and dinner at the East India Club, St. James's, London SW1Y 4LH, on 2 May for the signing of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists of Southern Africa by that doyen of postal history Mr Robson Lowe. The brief and informal ceremony amongst a small but distinguished gathering was introduced by Allan Drysdale (Rhodesia Study Circle), who summarised the citation before inviting Mr Lowe to add his signature to the many famous names already appearing. In his response, Mr Lowe recalled several anecdotes from his long-standing connections with South African philately.

The full citation, etc., together with a brief history of the Roll, appears in the January/February 1991 issue of the *South African philatelist*.

Through these columns we offer our congratulations to "Robbie" and at the same time acknowledge and thank him for his vast contribution to the philately and postal history of Southern Africa, in many fields and over many years.

HORIZONTAL AND VERTICAL PAIRS

John Davis, from Alicante in Spain, writes: What is the view of members of your society about horizontal and vertical pairs? Gibbons have a note that vertical pairs are worth about 50 per cent less but when I asked them for an explanation they replied that it is "something of a mystery" and thought it might have stemmed from "some long forgotten edict by a South African printed album publisher". To me it seems quite ridiculous to prefer a horizontal pair of a stamp with a horizontal format. This is demonstrated in particular by the 1935 Jubilee stamps. Surely it is better to go for the pair that produces the most compact shape - a horizontal pair of stamps with a vertical format and vertical pair for those with a horizontal format? It doesn't seem to me to matter that they are "worth" less though why on earth should they? Or is this sacrilegious? What do your members think?
