

MODERN POSTCARDS

Through the thoughtfulness of Mr Allen, I have been able to view the Philatelic Services leaflets published on the 'new' series that began on 1 July 1991.



SHEET COIL 12S (Updating of Vol. 42(4), pp.88-9)

The many collectors of the well-known Ship Penny red may ask why coil issues are of any use to them, they are Issue 8 Multipositives and also Issue 9: please see the Union of South Africa Catalogue, by Jack Hagger, pp.53-4, which implies some blocks of four or larger may be from Coil Sheet 12S. With the very kind assistance of Alec Page, who was not happy about the photocopies from which the illustrations were taken, much clearer pictures were suitably enlarged. With their help and an improved magnifier further information has been obtained.

Pair

The marginal pair with the signature of the late L. Simenhoff:

Left stamp: break in white panel over 'SS', see cat. 37c V1, and also R.12S V1.

Right stamp: black dot in oval vignette, about eight o'clock.

Block

The block of four:

11/3; 'F' of 'SUIDAFRIKA' has a line above it

11/4; red dot above small boat

12/3; minute red dot first 'A' of 'AFRICA'

12/4; red dot above mast head (V1) see V2.

Checking Simenhoff's listing, Coil 2; dot over last 'S' of posseel

11/3 listed as dots; 12/3 dot seems to be black, listed as RED left of 2nd yardarm.

(Age may darken red) — my remark

12/4 mast head dot is listed, other not.

The listing 'name' for varieties, etc., generally is the description given by the compiler and what it seems to him/her as will meet the situation, as a practical example the 37C V12, described as an arrow head, the sight name would suggest a 'pheon' to me, however 'arrow' is more easily understood than pheon, the mark used to identify H.M. Government's property. There should not be any doubt with 'dots', or 'spots'.

Finally, I shall quote from my book on coils: 'It was found that the vignette of R.12S were FIVE stamps out of step with the frames, proved by the various multipositive flaws. There are many of these, both frame and vignette...'.






EARLY RAILWAYS




Eröffnung der ersten 10 km. der Eisenbaler Swakopmund-Windhoek.



UPDATING PUTZEL

I am greatly indebted to Ralph Putzel for his book on SWA postmarks. There are a couple of items I have which aren't in the book and may be of interest. The first is the Kolmannskuppe conversion. This was converted to Kolmannskop by removing the final 'PE' and capping the 'U' to form an 'O', the double 'N' remaining as an error. Putzel mentions the final 'B' of the Guchab conversion (from Gochas) reverting to an 'S', but the 1925 Kolmanskop card here clearly shows reversion of the 'O' to 'U'. The registered cover illustrated in Putzel shows it still an 'O' in 1924. The other item is an Otavi Station cds which is similar, but different, from those shown. I have another similar with part of the German 'EISENBAHN' still remaining but the strike is not clear enough to warrant illustration.









POSTAGE DUE - Group IX

Bernard Doherty writing in *The Forerunners* Nov. 94/Feb. 95 (PSGSA bulletin) raises a query re the postage due 1d, suggesting that D38 was reprinted with a different exterior cylinder and guessed that it was done 1959 or 1960 in the early part of that year in that it had a much clearer frame printing to the 1961 decimal (1c) value as the colour was similar exterior frame with a finer screening giving it a similar clarity in the design.

He quoted *The Springbok*, March/April 1961, page 36 being printed with interior cylinder 110 and exterior 85, and upon examination under magnification (10x) showed that the leaves above and below the value tablet were not as finely printed as the pre-decimal stamp being examined.

He quoted Stamps of South Africa, Golden Jubilee Edition handbook with an excerpt.

He goes on to say, 'I realized the value of a good reference library, for I suddenly found that I had no detailed information at all on this "group" of postage due stamps' ... Then the assessment of other stamps to match the frame type ... and it is also a very good lesson in the need to have good reference books on your subject.

He does quote part of the heading to the section of IX group, but I will refer to it later.

I have Vol. 2 of the Golden Jubilee Handbook catalogue, and on page 74 it amends page 359 of the original work and my Vol. 1 has a notice of the amendment, and when the 1979 version of the Golden Jubilee Edition appeared it has the correct amendment.

You may wonder why I make note of remarks in the update of catalogues, well it was from my early training and has proved its use over the years.

Now the amendment: Vol. II, page 359, paragraph at top of page, delete the second and third sentence. Substitute 'Finally there were new issues of the 1d, 2d and 6d values from the new exterior cylinder 92. In the case of the 6d value, which appeared in February 1959, the interior cylinder was also new, number 63, but in the 1d value, which appeared in July 1960 and the 2d value at the end of 1960, the old cylinders were used again. Except for the frames being lighter and brighter in colour the stamps resemble those of the previous issues very closely in each case. Red sheet numbers appear on the left in the 1d and the 2d, and on the right hand margin of the 6d values.'

D38, 1d. After this item insert: 'D38A. 1d Black and rose-carmine and 4 varieties are listed'.

It also lists on page 75, D41A 2d. D44 'V's' to be deleted.

D44A 6d Slate-green and orange-vermilion.

The 1979 edition is correct as far as I can see, well anyway as to these items.

PRINTED ON: GOEBELS NO. B30 with multiple/eleven row perforator PAPER: Uncoated, supplied by U.S. Paper Corporation, U.S.A.

PERFORATION GAUGE: 13.75 x 14

Printed in Single Die Sheet Format of 20 rows x 5 stamps each. The top and bottom margins are perforated through and carry blue single line broken bars, while the left and right margins are imperforate, except for a single perforation hole at each row and contain centrally placed blue pre-manufactured arrows. Two cylinders were used 16 (yellow) and 86 (blue) and they are positioned below stamp 5 or row 20. Sheet numbers, when present, are four red numerals positioned in the right margin.

Of the above seven printings only two, namely the fifth and seventh, can be established with the Cylinder/Control blocks. They are the only two with SMALL hole perfs — the fifth has the Coat of Arms Wmk. whereas the seventh has no Wmk. To establish the other five printings it is necessary to have positional pieces of single or double row right marginal vertical strips with a sheet number with either the bottom or top right corner or the marginal arrow which is positioned between rows 10 and 11.

Reference is made to the article on the above subject by R.D. Allen on pp. 16-19 of *The Springbok* 41 (1), Jan/March 1993 and the article 'The 2c Gold Pouring' by John Davis and the 'Listing of the 2c - First Issue' by J.M. Smart on pp. 58-9 of *The Springbok* 41 (3), July Sept 1993.

R.D. Allen refers to an article 'Colours and Shades' by Dr H.J. Raubenheimer in the South African Philatelist of April 1967. In the next issue of the SA Philatelist, May 1967, is

another article by the same author entitled 'The Significance of the Position of Sheet Numbers'. This article has played a very important part in my studies of the First R.S.A. definitives because he states: 'It can now be seen that the position of the sheet numbers is definitely related to a particular printing and that it should be then possible to identify any printing'. Accordingly all my studies of the various values of the Republican First Definitives are grouped under the Cylinder numbers and then under the different printings. The last paragraph of Dr Raubenheimer's article reads: 'In conclusion, the study of the sheet number positions has led to a new understanding of the whole question of the printings of the Republic stamps. Much collating has still to be done. New facts may come to light....'

LET US NOW CONSIDER THE 2C CYLINDER NOS. 16 86:

In the SACC we find two variations of this cylinder number: 200 (May 61) with Coat of Arms Wmk. and 211 (August 1963) with no wmk. The Handbook/Catalogue of the Federation, which many specialists of the R.S.A. First Definitives use, has three distributions with Coat of Arms Wmk. and one with no wmk. R.D. Allen's listing shows a similar listing to that of the Handbook/Catalogue even to the extent that the SG Nos. he quotes are identical to those of the Handbook/Catalogue. I feel that although Mr Allen explains that the cylinder No. 16 was used in error instead of 91 it cannot now be introduced into listings or catalogues as 91 does not exist on any cylinder blocks and thus can only cause more confusion in the series which already is fairly complicated and confused. Then we come to Jim Smart's listing in which he reflects two printings with Coat of Arms Wmk. and one with no wmk.

In the Handbook/Catalogue each value is divided into groups, which are divided into issues and these are broken down into distributions - then are quoted Cylinder Numbers, Watermarks, Sheet Numbers and then the Issue Date. My records deviate from such a system as I start with the Cylinder-Nos. under which I list the different printings together with details of the variable factors by which printings can be distinguished. Variable factors include perforations, watermarks, sheet numbers, paper and any other characteristics — then I quote the date of issue. To prevent any possibility of confusion I correlate each printing to a Handbook/Catalogue No. as well as a SACC No., whenever it is possible.

It is necessary to explain how the positions of sheet numbers are reflected. Sheet numbers are normally found in the bottom or right hand margins. If in the bottom margin it will be under the stamp quoted, if in the side margin it will be alongside the row quoted. When sheets/panes consist of 20x10 or 20x5 stamps, if sheet numbers are present, there are always two similar numbers eleven stamps apart. If a sheet number is opposite row 4 the same number will be opposite row 15. If a sheet/pane consists of 10x10 stamps, there will only be one sheet number. Sheet numbers can be red with four digits (four Types exist: refer *The Springbok* 39 (6) p.105), black with five digits (Types I and II) and black with six digits when printed on the Albertina printer.

Giving a few examples will clarify the reading of positions of sheet numbers:


- 6(2) 7(2) means that two digits are under stamp 6 (17) and two under stamp 7 (18) or alongside row 6 (17) and row 7 (18) if the sheet numbers are in the side margin.
- 5(1) (1) 6(2) means one digit under stamp 5 (16), one under the perforations between stamps 5 and 6 and two digits under stamp 6 (17), or similarly under the respective rows.
- (1) 4(3) means one digit under the vertical perforations between stamps 3 and 4 and three under stamp 4 or similarly opposite the respective rows.


Cylinder Block of four with wide bottom margin. A Comb Join is seen at the bottom of the margin.

TOP RIGHT:


Top right comer marginal strip of three with wide top margin, showing the Comb Join at the top of the margin.

The block of four and the strip of three can be from printings 1, 2, 3, 4 or 6 as they are both Coat of Arms Wmk. and large hole perfs.











BOTTOM: Double central horizontal rows with marginal arrows and Comb Join below row 10.




SEVENTH PRINTING

John Davis CROSS CHECK LIST OF THE FIRST DEFINITIVES OF THE REPUBLIC OF SOUTH AFRICA

Groups are derived from the Atlas catalogue and are as follows:

- I Original design; non-fluorescent paper; arms watermark.
- II Original design; non-fluorescent paper; no watermark.
- III Original design; fluorescent back and front; 'single' RSA watermark.
- IV Redrawn or new design; fluorescent back and front; 'single' RSA watermark.
- V Redrawn or new design; Swiss paper fluorescent on front only; RSA tête-bêche watermark.
- VI Redrawn or new design; Swiss paper fluorescent on front only; phosphor frame; RSA tête-bêche watermark.
- VII Redrawn or new design; Harrison paper fluorescent back and front; phosphor frame; RSA tête-bêche watermark.
- VIII Redrawn or new design; phosphor paper; RSA tête-bêche watermark; perf. 14.
- IX Redrawn or new design; phosphor paper; no watermark; P. 121/2.

Features include any additional information, particularly anything which helps to distinguish an individual stamp.

Perfs are the approximations used by SACC and in some instances are slightly different from those used by SG. Precise counts are not necessary nor helpful for identification.

Colours and shades are those given by SACC wherever possible but the SACC listings are incomplete so some are by inference and are marked (?). In some instances SG descriptions are used instead. Many vary considerably from one catalogue to the other and are sometimes contradictory.

Coils, according to Atlas, must be in unbroken strips of 22 to prove they are not from a sheet. In fact all but five have unique features which enable them to be identified with certainty as singles. Those that cannot are marked *.

SACC presents the various issues in much the same groups as Atlas (but does not use this term) except for the two phosphor-tagged issues which are amalgamated.

Atlas gives no colour descriptions and lists only a few of the most dramatic shade variations. It does not list chalky or glossy papers.

Arcade presents the issues in the same groups as Atlas but does not use group numbering. It gives basic colours but few shade variations.

SG does not list variations in fluorescence or phosphorescence although their existence is mentioned in footnotes. Hence groups IV, V and VIII are amalgamated as are groups VI and VII. SG appears to list more shade variations but most are probably incidental to other variations such as fluorescence or phosphorescence. Where this cannot be verified by the date of issue, the SG alternatives are given.

A MILLENNIUM STAMP EXHIBITION

Although the year 2000 is still five years away a number of discussions have already taken place involving the British Philatelic Trust through the Working Group on International Affairs, Stamp World Exhibitions Ltd., and Royal Mail National.

These discussions have been directed at assessing the feasibility of organising and, most importantly, funding a major philatelic event in the UK to mark the Millennium and maintain the long established practice of our having such events every decade.

In anticipation that such an event will be organised a number of options are under consideration and reservations have been made against April/May and September 2000 in the FIP list of forthcoming exhibitions.

Clearly it is important to introduce new ideas, in particular those which will not only meet the needs of the existing philatelic community but are likely to ensure the continuation of the hobby in succeeding generations. PHILATELIC FEDERATION OF SOUTHERN AFRICA.

Report of 3 August 1995

The Philatelic Federation's delegation met with the Post Office management on 27 July 1995.

Here is a synopsis of answers given to points raised by us, and of statements made by Post Office spokespeople.

General operations policy re stamp issues

There will be 20 stamp issues per annum, generally of one stamp only, inscribed for the standard postage rate; or of short sets of 2 stamps. An issue might, however, be a series of stamps, eg showing South Africa's Nobel Prize winners.

Tourism stamps will be continued.

A new definitive set is not now feasible as huge stocks of current high value stamps are still available. The number of stamps in a definitive set will be reduced.

Stamp sizes will be standardised on three formats. The large size of recent years is unpopular.

First-day envelopes will be standardised and formatted to fit an album page.

A Stamp Programme Advisory Committee will suggest stamp issues. The PO marketing section will select from these and test the marketability of proposed issues. At a later stage there will be 9 regional committees to propose stamps, with one seat for philatelists.

Many items of mail are now being franked with counter cash register slips. A better-looking cash register slip is being investigated.

Postal museum and research unit

Post Office management is not keen on having a museum. Yet the heritage material should be kept somewhere. An inventory of articles, documents and stamps was being compiled and much material has been traced and is being recovered.

Philatelic Services will establish its own archive as a research centre. This will also contain artwork for previous stamp issues, only a handful of such being still missing.
